Disagreeing



Saying you partly agree

Expressing disagreement has **two types**.

The first one is **when you partly** agree with your partner's opinion, but you also want to add your own view.

See how you can do this.

Repeat the sentences.



I agree with much of what
you say, but ...



I see what you mean, but ...



Yes, but on the other hand
we shouldn't forget about ...



You have a point there, but ...

Formal expressions



Saying you partly agree

You can say these in a very **sophisticated** way like this:

I wouldn't go as far as to say that.

There's a lot of truth in what you say, but ...

Polite disagreement

In an exam situation, you can only **disagree** in a **polite** way, otherwise you either offend the examiner or you won't get good marks for your performance.



I'm afraid I don't agree (with ...)



I'm afraid I disagree.



That's not the way I see it.



Actually, I think ...

Polite disagreement

In a **formal situation** it goes like this:





I see things rather differently
myself.



I'm afraid I can't accept your
view.



I entirely disagree (with ...)

Informal expressions



Impolite disagreement

When you **talk to a friend**, you can use some of these sentences, but you should know they are rather **informal**.

Only use them with good friends!





Nonsense!



No way!

Never!





You must be joking.



You can't be serious.
